# Pastor's Corner Dear Church Family,

I want to take a moment to thank you for recognizing the importance of continuing education in the life of a pastor. It is a time of growth, rest, connection with peers, and new insights — all of which are vital to serving you well.

You may not realize this, but being a pastor is a little...weird. At least outside the walls of the church! When conversations about my vocation arise with new people, their reactions generally fall into three categories:

- 1. **The Face Falls.** Some people instantly shut down. Smiles fade. They simply don't know what to do with the idea of meeting a pastor.
- 2. **The Confessors.** Others feel the need to confess their life's sins on the spot. (If I wear my collar to the grocery store, the trip can take hours!) Sometimes, I do it intentionally to be a public witness to Jesus Christ. It never ceases to amaze me how the Spirit moves.
- 3. **The Long-Ago Churchgoers.** Then there are those who feel the need to explain all about the church they attended 20 years ago and their intention to get back to church...someday. I always smile and encourage them to find a church home ours or another. Sometimes it ends in mumbles, but we keep asking. We keep inviting.

All this to say: Continuing education, especially in person, gives pastors the rare and important opportunity to gather with others who understand this unique calling. It offers space to share the particular joys and challenges of our congregations, to be spiritually fed in worship, to hear the Gospel preached to us, to learn, to pray, and to laugh — sometimes late into the night in conversations that are worth every moment of tiredness the next day.

The educational components themselves are as wide and varied as ministry is: family systems, pastoral care, preaching, engaging youth, intergenerational ministry, end-of-life care, and so much more. This learning can never end. It is part of faithfully stewarding the call I have received.

In May, I attended my required First Call Theological Education retreat with pastors from all three Iowa synods. We learned about expected growth and shrinkage patterns in rural, suburban, and urban areas — helping us have honest conversations about where we are, where we are going, and how we can serve with our communities for the sake of the Gospel.

Later in the month, I participated in the Festival of Homiletics. While the main conference was in Atlanta, I joined a gathering of ten other pastors in the hills of Dubuque, where we streamed keynote speakers, worshiped together, and shared in breakout conversations. It lowered the cost and increased the sense of community. Not every conference allows for such accessibility, and it was a special gift to learn not only within our own Lutheran circle but also from preachers and theologians across the wider Christian community.

I am deeply grateful for these experiences — and for you, who make it possible. Thank you for investing in my health, growth, and renewal as your pastor. It is a gift that bears fruit not just for me, but for all of us.

## **Semi-Annual Congregational Meeting**



#### **From Easter to Ordinary Time: Living the Resurrection**

The celebration of Easter is more than a single day; it is a whole season of joy and renewal! According to the church year, the Easter season lasts for fifty days — from Easter Sunday until Pentecost. This year, Pentecost falls on June 8th. During these weeks, our readings, prayers, and songs center around the incredible reality of Christ's resurrection. We hear stories of Jesus appearing to his followers, offering peace, hope, and the call to share the Good News.

In John 14, Jesus promises, "Peace I leave with you; my peace I give to you. I do not give to you as the world gives. Do not let your hearts be troubled, and do not let them be afraid" (John 14:27). Each Sunday of Easter invites us to lean deeper into that peace, even as the world around us remains uncertain.

At Pentecost, we celebrate the gift of the Holy Spirit, who breathes life into the Church and sends us out to be Christ's witnesses. As Acts 2 tells us, "All of them were filled with the Holy Spirit and began to speak in other languages, as the Spirit gave them ability" (Acts 2:4). Pentecost marks not an ending, but a beginning — the launch of the Church's mission in the world.

After Pentecost, we move into a season called "Ordinary Time." Unlike how we

often use the word "ordinary," in the church calendar it doesn't mean boring or routine! It comes from the Latin *ordinalis*, meaning "numbered," because the Sundays are counted, one after another, week by week. Ordinary Time is a season of growth — both in nature and in faith. Our readings will focus on Jesus' teachings and parables, helping us to live out the Gospel in everyday life.

Even as Easter fades from the calendar, the promise of resurrection never ends. Christ is risen — not just in the springtime, not just in the dramatic moments, but in every breath, every step, every ordinary day. I pray this next season be a time when we carry the joy of Easter forward, living as people shaped by hope, generosity, and the steady love of Christ.

# Korver Sindelar - 1st Place Martin Luther Presentation

We're proud to share that Korver Sindelar, a 7th grader at Harding Middle School, took 1<sup>st</sup> place locally in this year's National History Day competition! The theme was *Rights and Responsibilities*, and Korver chose to explore the legacy of Martin Luther and the Protestant Reformation.

His project focused on Martin Luther's rights and responsibilities as a reformer—how he challenged the church of his time, stood firm in his convictions, and helped spark lasting change in both religious and civic life. As part of his presentation, Korver built a model church and dove into deep study. He interviewed Pastor Bunny, explored the meaning of Martin Luther's *solas*—three key teachings of the Reformation: that we are saved by grace alone, through faith alone, revealed in scripture alone—not by anything we can earn or buy—and made use of the *Book of Concord* to better understand the foundation of Lutheran belief and responsibility.



In April, he advanced to the State competition, where his family and Pastor Bunny had the joy of cheering him on and watching him beam with pride. We're already looking ahead to next year's project and the possibility of going even further!

Thank you for your prayers and kind words—they have been deeply felt and appreciated.

Korver will be sharing his project with the congregation **after worship on Sunday, June 8**, in the sanctuary. All are welcome to hear his presentation and celebrate with him!
